

Montpellier-Sète's candidacy for designation as France's European Capital of Culture in 2028 was shortlisted from amongst the nine cities that submitted applications. Four are still in the running for this honour.

Multiple criteria were taken into consideration: the proposed organisation and the involvement of local actors, as well as the European dimension of each application.




Montpellier-Sète's application represents a coalition of six parts of the Hérault region: Montpellier Méditerranée Métropole of course, but also the Sète and Agde urban areas and the Pays de Lunel, Grand Pic Saint-Loup and Vallée de l'Hérault (around Gignac) district communities, for a total of 132 municipalities.

All are embarking on an adventure that is as exciting as it is new: an application to become the European Capital of Culture in 2028.

The other three French finalist cities are Rouen, Clermont-Ferrand and Bourges.

A REGION COMMITTED TO CULTURE

This candidacy will foster the emergence of new itineraries connecting the region's territories and residents. It will give our cultural ambitions a new lease of life by building a long-term joint strategy based on the belief that we share a common destiny.



MUST-SEE EVENTS

IN MONTPELLIER



RUGBY WORLD CUP IN FRANCE

The biggest event of the year will undoubtedly be the Rugby World Cup.

Montpellier will be a base camp, with rugby union teams coming here to practice and train.

Australia's illustrious Wallabies will be holding a training camp here from 17-24 August 2023 in preparation for the Rugby World Cup. They will be returning for a pre-Olympics training camp in 2024.

And Samoa has chosen Montpellier as its base camp from 8 September to 28 October 2023.



MONTPELLIER TO HOST THE EUROPEAN JUDO **CHAMPIONSHIPS IN NOVEMBER 2023**

Montpellier's Olympic momentum has sparked additional projects like the 2023 European Judo Championships, which will be held at the city's Sud de France Arena from 2-5 November 2023. With nearly 700 judokas in attendance, this will serve as a dress rehearsal for all the continent's competitors, especially the France team, less than a year before the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

Montpellier will also serve as the support base for French judo during the team's preparations for the Paris 2024 Olympics.

MONTPELLIER TERRE DE JEUX 2024

Montpellier is a land of sports which achieved a historic double last year. winning the French Rugpionships of 2022.



When it won the label of Terre de Jeux 2024 (Land of the 2024 Games). Mont-

pellier was named one of the official Games Preparation Centres qualified to receive international delegations for the Olympics and Paralympics. Olympic hopefuls will be training in some 25 disciplines across our region.

In December, the city hosted an international conference entitled Les Enjeux des Jeux ("The Stakes of the Games") and the Terre de Jeux 2024 forum with Tony Estanguet. Chairman of the Paris 2024 Organising Committee, and Amélie Oudéa-Castéra, French Minister of Sports.

Thanks to the city's ambitious sport policy, multiple training camps have been certified for the following disciplines: Artistic Swimming, Athletics, Basketball, Beach Volleyball, Breaking, Cycling BMX, Fencing, Football, Handball, Judo, Rugby Sevens, Skateboarding, Swimming, Table Tennis, Volleyball, Water Polo and Paralympics.

The Wallabies have already signed a contract for a rugby sevens training camp in 2024, and France's judo team has made Montpellier their pre-Games base camp. Other nations are expected to follow suit. To be continued...

Top secret: Montpellier's CREPS (Regional Centre for Physical and Sports Education) will be hosting Olympic contenders: Japan's intercollegiate volleyball team in late February, and then later on France's judo and women's and men's volleyball teams, New Zealand and South Africa for athletics, plus Australia and Israel for table tennis, with other delegations forthcoming.



The Paris 2024 Olympic Torch Relay will pass through Montpellier, Sète and Millau in spring 2024.

It will be carried across Place de la Comédie in spring 2024, and Montpellier will even be a "stopover city": the city will receive the Relay toward the end of the day and will organise a free, festive programme of activities that will be open to anyone, revolving around the values of sport and the Olympic spirit.

UNVEILING OF TRAM LINE 5

Barthélémy Toguo, renowned Cameroonian artist, was selected to decorate the tram cars based on the assigned theme of "science and botany". He devised a leafy design featuring crocodiles, parrots, fish, salamanders and human faces.

In 2025, the future Tram Line 5 will stop at major parks from Clapiers to Lavérune, including the city's botanical garden and its zoo.

MONTPELLIER, SOON TO HAVE EUROPE'S BIGGEST NETWORK OF FREE PUBLIC TRANSPORT

The conurbation's public transport network will be completely free to local residents beginning on 21 December 2023. As a tool for combating climate change, this measure will also have an impact on its users' buying power.



TRANSPORT: A NEW STYLE OF TRANSPORT IS COMING SOON TO MONTPELLIER MEDITERRANEE METROPOLE!



In line with its eco-friendly policy, the City of Montpellier is doing everything it can to accelerate the ecological transition and decarbonise modes of transport. Following the new tram line project, slated for delivery in 2025, Montpellier will be developing a new style of transport to offer ever better environmental protection, called Bus-Trams. Anyone looking for a greener, more economical alternative to driving a car will find this new option to be an excellent solution.

DJAMEL TATAH, LE THEATRE DU SILENCE 10 December 2022

to 16 April 2023

Starting in the mid-1980s, his work has been based on extremely simple paintings, stripped down to the essentials, in which human figures are depicted against flat, coloured backgrounds.

Djamel Tatah's oeuvre questions our presence in the world and our empathetic connection to the humanity all around us. This exhibition of some 40 works of art displays



different periods in the artist's career, taking a thematic approach that explores several of the conceptual components that appear in his body of work, fuelled by philosophy and art history, from painting to dancing, theatre and cinema.

The work of Germaine Richier (1902-1959) occupies a place in the history of 20th century sculpture that is both unique and essential. Trained in the tradition of Auguste Rodin and Antoine Bourdelle, the artist made a name for herself at barely 25 years of age. Since it reopened in 2007, Musée Fabre has had a room in its permanent collection dedicated to this sculptor who grew up just outside Montpellier. In fact, Richier began building her reputation as one of the greats at the ESBA Montpellier art school. Situated between the sculptors Rodin and César, Germaine Richier occupies a central place in modern sculpture.

ALFRED BRUYAS, COLLECTIONNEUR ET MECENE DU

SPOTLIGHT

Six pieces by local sculptor Germaine Richier will be travelling from Montpellier to the Centre Pompidou in Paris for a retrospective dedicated to the artist and featuring more than 200 works of art, from March to June 2023.

MUSEE FABRE

7 October 2023 to 11 February 2024

The year 2021 marked the 200th anniversary of the birth of Alfred Bruyas (1821-1877), one of the main donors to Musée Fabre. This native of Montpellier, who was a passionate collector of art from his era, acquired pieces by major artists the likes of Alexandre Cabanel, Eugène Delacroix and Gustave Courbet. He made a decisive contribution to the addition of modern art to Musée Fabre's collections, namely by gifting the museum two iconic paintings and manifestos of realism, The Bathers and The Meeting by Gustave Courbet.

MO.CO., CONTEMPORARY ART IN MONTPELLIER

From training to collections, by way of production, exhibitions and art mediation, Montpellier Contemporain (MO.CO.) is an artistic ecosystem that includes an art school and two exhibition venues,

MO.CO. ESBA (art school), MO.CO. Panacée (contemporary art centre) and MO.CO. (which houses the collections and hosts large-scale exhibitions from around the world). Panacée is a free art centre that is open to the public.

MO.CO. EXHIBITIONS

Immortal 11 March to 4 June 2023 at MO.CO. and 11 March to 7 May 2023 at MO.CO. Panacée



Immortal offers a new and ambitious panorama of young French figurative painting. This is the first exhibition to span both MO.CO. art centres, divided into two parts. MO.CO. will present artists who are emblematic of the French art scene, born between 1970 and the early 1980s, with a clear taste for figurative painting in which humans hold an essential place.

MO.CO. Panacée will show the next generation, from the '80s to the '90s, revisiting different forms of genre painting (history, portrait, landscape, still life, etc.). This bountiful, sensitive exhibition is designed to pay homage to painting and its physical, materialist, erotic and romantic aspects.

Neo Rauch: Le Songe de la Raison » Germany 8 July to 15 October 2023



Known for his enigmatic scenes inspired by East Germany's past, in a blend of dreams and historicism, he is now the leader of the New Leipzig School, a movement in contemporary German figurative painting.

Rauch's recent shows include a solo exhibition at The Drawing Center in New York in 2019, entitled Neo Rauch: Aus dem Boden / From the Floor, and another from March to September 2021 at Gutshaus Steglitz in Berlin, called Neo Rauch: Der Beifang.

Huma Bhabha » Pakistan 18 November 2023 to February 2024



Pakistani artist Huma Bhabha is known for her uniquely grotesque figurative forms that often appear dissected or dismembered. Bhabha often uses found materials in her sculptures, including styrofoam, cork, rubber, paper, wire, and clay. She occasionally incorporates objects given to her by other people into

her artwork. Her pieces have been exhibited at venues in New York, Paris and London, amongst others.

AFTER SCHOOL 2ND ARTPRESS BIENNALE OF YOUNG ARTISTS MO.CO. Panacée

1 October 2022 to 8 January 2023

This event will showcase 32 graduates of French public art schools who have already launched their artistic careers, selected by a panel of judges chaired by the Spanish filmmaker and artist Albert Serra.

Partnering with the contemporary art review artpress, MO.CO. Montpellier Contemporain, Montpellier Méditerranée Métropole and the City of Montpellier, the Biennale will be taking over several rooms at Musée Fabre, all of MO.CO. Panacée and Espace Dominique Bagouet, treating visitors to a real urban art walk.

Ana Mendieta: Aux Commencements3 June to 10 September 2023, MO.CO. Panacée

Ana Mendieta is a Cuban-American performance artist,



sculptor, painter, photographer and video artist who straddles the intersection of land art and body art. She is best known for her "earthbody" artwork.

Her work, which explores the gender binary, adopts an essentialist vision of the body and gender relations. Ana Mendieta's art tends to be autobiographical

and performance-based, addressing themes such as feminism, violence, death and belonging.

Her political pieces are generally associated with the four elements of nature and are imbued with a strong spiritual dimension.

SOL! #2 at MO.CO. Panacée 8 October 2023 to 14 January 2024

SOL! The Territory Biennial celebrates the creativity that fills Montpellier and its region.

The first edition (2021), entitled "One Step Aside", explored the fringes of art through the work of 32 artists selected from within an area running from Sète to Alès and from Nîmes to Béziers. The second edition (2022) will provide an opportunity to discover a whole other aspect of the local artistic scene.

MO.CO. PANACÉE

Each Thursday evening at 7 pm, MO.CO. Panacée hosts special encounters and conferences relating to contemporary art. The programme for 2023 is currently under development.

MO.CO. regularly organises workshops for all ages, escape rooms, concerts and snack times.



PAVILLON POPULAIRE - FREE EXHIBITIONS

The Pavillon Populaire is a photography exhibition space that is free to the public.

Its programming is always at the highest level, with work by nationally and internationally renowned artists. An average of three exhibitions are held there each year.

La Surface et la Chair. Madame d'Ora, Vienna-Paris, 1907-1957 » Austria 18 February to 16 April 2023

Dora Kallmus (1881-1963), also known as Madame d'Ora,



was a renowned Austrian photographer who worked as a portraitist for high society, first in Vienna (then a major cultural centre and laboratory of modernity in Europe) and later in Paris during the Roaring Twenties. From her portrait of the painter Gustav Klimt in 1908 to the one of Picasso in 1958, she used the most modern techniques to capture her many different subjects over the course of an extraordinary career spanning more than 50 years.

The Endless War: Antoni Campañà » Spain 1 July to 24 September 2023

In 2018, a house near Barcelona was emptied out before being demolished.



Two red boxes were found there. What did they contain? An incredible discovery: 5,000 photographs taken by Antoni Campañà Bandranas (1906-1989) during the three years of the Spanish Civil War. Together, they form a fresco of daily life in wartime, from the perspective of one of Catalonia's greatest pictorial photographers.



LATTARA IN LATTES: LATTARA ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE - MUSÉE HENRI PRADES

WANT A BETTER UNDERSTANDING OF THE HISTORY OF CURRENT CIVILISATIONS? Montpellier Méditerranée Métropole's Lattara Archaeological Site - Musée Henri Prades, located in Lattes, invites you to take a huge leap back in time to discover the history of the women and men who came before us in this region. A fascinating experience awaits you!

A PORT OCCUPIED BY VARIOUS ANCIENT CIVILISATIONS

Active for more than 800 years, the port in Lattara was a major economic and cultural meeting place for the peoples who lived around the Western Mediterranean Basin (Etruscans, Greeks in Marseille, Iberians, Romans, etc.) and the local Celtic populations. After a break lasting several centuries, Lattes became Montpellier's port during the Middle Ages.



LATTARA, AN ANCIENT PORT BUILT IN THE 6^{TH} CENTURY BC

The archaeological museum is located near Lattara, an important ancient port in the Western Mediterranean. Built in the old delta of the coastal river, the Lez (Ledum flumen in Latin), it was occupied from the $6^{\rm th}$ century BC to the $3^{\rm rd}$ century AD.

EVERYTHING IS CHAOS19 November 2022 to 3 April 2023



Their voices in chorus resound, this night. Everything is chaos. This sentence coming out of a thousand throats is transformed into a song of struggle, handed down from generation to generation. The echo goes back much further, millennia, when sang the first peoples of water and sand.

Around queer archaeology, Aïcha Snoussi imagines the story of a vanished civilisation on the Mediterranean coast. Through the kháos - the gap - her work creates cracks in official narratives to accommodate other

narratives. Mirroring the objects in the museum, new vestiges tell of these bodies which still sing under the sea. An exhibition produced in partnership with MO.CO. Montpellier Contemporain.

STATUES-MENHIRS: NEOLITHIC STONE MIRRORS 7 October 2022 to 6 March 2023

The statue-menhirs mark the beginnings of monumental statuary in Europe, a phenomenon which

appeared almost simultaneously on the Atlantic seaboard and in the Mediterranean around 4700-4500 BC.

In Occitania, a few examples of these sculpted menhirs have recently been unearthed. Dating from the end of the Neolithic period (3300-2200 BC), they depict human beings through certain physical attributes (eyes, nose, hands, etc.), items of clothing (belts and coats) and objects (necklaces and axes).



MUSEE D'ART BRUT

This museum with 800 m² of space plus a Mediterranean garden gives visitors access to a major collection. With some 2,000 pieces in its possession, this collection provides a glimpse at various vernacular artists, singular creators and other visionaries, surrealists from every background, ranging from the "historical" period at the turn of the 20th century to today's international outsider art. In addition to the permanent exhibition, three temporary exhibitions are organised every year. Each one is presented by a curator who is well-known in the art world and is supported by a patron.

PASCAL VERBENA 4 January to 30 April 2023

Pascal Verbena was born on 16 August 1941 in Marseille's Old Port district, where his mother was a fishmonger. He was nicknamed the "coal cherub". A solitary child, he was sent to boarding school at a very young age and got into the habit of hiding his treasures in a beam in the attic that he used as a place of refuge. An experienced fisherman, he spent long stretches of time, whenever he could, in the wild rocky inlets of Marseilleveyre and Saintes-Maries-de-la-Mer, where he gathered driftwood

which he piled up in an old depot that served as his studio. Pascal Verbena has participated in many exhibitions (Les Singuliers de l'Art in 1978, Outsiders in London, New York and other countries, Galerie Chave in Vence, etc.).



ESPACE DOMINIQUE BAGOUET DISCOVER THE REGION'S ARTISTS!

Espace Dominique Bagouet is an art and heritage exhibition space that is free to the public. Dedicated to regional artists from the 19th and 20th centuries, its success has continued to grow since it reopened in 2012. https://www.montpellier.fr/3945-espacedominique-bagouet.htm

ART GALLERIES

Montpellier has many independent art galleries.

Their landscape varies greatly, with each location having its own focus and arranging temporary exhibitions to the delight of art lovers.

Galerie de l'Ancien Courrier is known for featuring mainly figurative painters from the region, at Cabane Galerie you will be greeted by the artists whose work is on display, and don't forget the new Parcelle 473 with its emphasis on street art. And all of them boast amazing collections.

SPOTLIGHT ART GALLERIES ON DISPLAY AT ART MONTPELLIER

The 7th edition of this Mediterranean contemporary art fair will take place from Thursday to Sunday, 16-19 November 2023, in Hall B2 of the Parc des Expositions! Some 70 national and international galleries will be exhibiting their work there.

PARCELLE 473 URBAN AND CONTEMPORARY ART CENTRE



It has been two years since the Parisian gallery owner Laurent Rigail embarked on an original adventure with his family: transforming the old family wine storehouse into a contemporary art centre. Parcelle 473 gets its name from the plot number on which it is located in Montpellier's Malbosc district - the last plot of farmland surrounded by greenery that is still safe from urbanisation. The venue is open to the public by appointment only. The storehouse's restoration was funded using Laurent's own money, with no grants.

Visitors are able to discover, amongst other things, the history of the street art and graffiti movement, as well as work by M. Chat, L'Atlas, JonOne, Nasty and many other references in the world of urban and contemporary art.

Parcelle 473 has a stock of about 100 pieces, donated or loaned by private collectors and artists. It plans to develop an acquisition policy for the future.



Montpellier is booming, with openings, expansions and renovations occurring at breakneck speed.
2022 and 2023 mark an important turning point in the

city's architecture, with three hotels, a youth hostel and luxury villas on the programme. Plus, new restaurants are popping up, not to mention chefs moving around.

LE MAJE HOSTEL

A youth hostel slated to open in April 2023



20 rooms (including two doubles) capable of sleeping up to 100 guests, with private bathrooms upstairs, a Mediterranean restaurant with 120 seats (60 in the dining room and 60 outside), not to mention a 250 \mbox{m}^2 basement set up as leisure and breakfast rooms for the hostel's guests.

Restaurant: Meraki, led by 27-year-old Chef Léo Guerquin-Kern, who previously worked at various bistronomic venues in Paris.

APARTHOTEL ADAGIO

6 RUE BAUDIN Opening early April 2023



39 spacious, fully refurbished apartments for up to 4 people are stylishly decorated and come with a dishwasher and Chromecast TV. There are also lounge areas, a large patio, a shared kitchen, and leisure and coworking spaces.

The guest house is the perfect spot for a couple's enchanted getaway or a corporate seminar.





The site will be home to France's BMX Freestyle Hub and will serve as a training ground for the 2024 Olympics.

In addition to a series of repairs and adjustments carried out within the stadium, the recently completed renovation of the athletics track will be of benefit to everyone. The smart track, designed by the German firm Polytan, will be usable in "leisure mode" or "professional mode".





CONSTRUCTION OF 13 NEW ARCHITECTURAL FOLIES

After La Folie Divine by Farshid Moussavi and L'Arbre Blanc by Sou Fujimoto in the early 2010s, Montpellier is reinitiating its architectural Folies with a presentation of the 13 future sites of these new buildings.

These 13 new Folies, designed by big names in the world of architecture, will be contributing to the city's urban history.

For decades now, Montpellier, a city that welcomes contemporary architecture, has been working on an ambitious urban development project, based in particularly on the creation of an extraordinary, contemporary built heritage across its territory.

As a reminder, the Montpellier Folies are the expression of middle-class architectural creativity which began in the 18th century with the construction of holiday homes in landscaped parks that were once on the outskirts of the city (now within its limits following its growth).



CHATEAU DE CASTRIES



Renovation of the Château de Castries

Over the past five centuries, this château, with its imposing elegance and massive allure, was the birthplace of the La Croix de Castries family. Nowadays, it is owned by the town of Castries. Les Amis du Château is an association that is dedicated to promoting the site and sharing its history.

Tours are available by private appointment with Les Amis du Château.

Its grounds are open seven days a week.

The Tourist Office also organises guided tours of the château beginning in the spring.

ANATOMY CONSERVATORY AT THE FACULTY OF MEDICINE



Extensive work is in progress (2022-2023) to protect the conservatory's scientific treasures.

At the University of Montpellier's historic Faculty of Medicine building, work of vital importance is under way to preserve its heritage. Its anatomy lab will be closed for an unspecified period of time.

The guided tour offered by the Tourist Office, "Voyage into the Heart of Anatomy" will lead participants into the dissection room.



LES HALLES 610 IN JACOU



On an industrial wasteland that had been abandoned for 10 years, Les Halles 610 is now a 900 m² market building with 17 stalls dedicated to fine cuisine and products sourced from short supply chains.

There's something for every taste: low temperature cooking, Italian and Indonesian delicatessens, a bakery, a cheesemonger, a butcher, a shellfish stall, a pizzeria and a food truck.

Les Halles has two lovely terraces for on-site dining, as well as a kids' play area. Les Halles 610 is open daily from 7:30 to at least 10 pm.

LES NOUVELLES GRISETTES... THE JEWEL IN OUR TEXTILE CROWN



Spanning 1,000 m² on the ground floor of the old Halles Sud de France, Les Nouvelles Grisettes offers unique and totally innovative services and activities.

It is, first and foremost, a participatory textiles workshop aimed at both professionals in the sector and companies. It is also a showcase for fashion and creativity in the region. Les Nouvelles Grisettes sells a wide range of products made along a short supply chain, and also puts on fashion shows and craft markets, as well as providing a complete range of training and workshops. An ecofriendly venue including a community restaurant, Mon Cuisinier, Les Nouvelles Grisettes supports creations made in Occitania.

Latest news: December 2022 to June 2023: Les Nouvelles Grisettes will have a pop-up shop on Place de la Comédie, featuring some 30 brands produced by creators from the region.



DID YOU KNOW? In the 18th century, a grisette was an elegant, hardworking shopgirl. They were ambassadors for Montpellier-style beauty and elegance up until the end of the 19th century.

At the time, they were independent women who managed to escape their modest living conditions through their willpower and their desire to learn.





VILLA DES CENT REGARDS

Construction of this villa began in 1936-1937 and was carried out by a particularly imaginative Italian builder. He was so imaginative that the Villa des Cent Regards, tucked away in Montpellier's Aiguelongue district, continues to be stuff of dreams for many young children. Its owner, Victor Grazzi, christened it the "Villa of a Hundred Views", because you just have to wander around to get 100 different views. He also claimed that, between the different buildings, there were 100 little windows offering so many views. The villa was looted in 2017, but in early 2020, a Middle Ages enthusiast named Alain Viricel began work to restore it to its former glory. An association offers tours of the villa and organises

exhibitions, conferences and art workshops there.



TOURISM AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

The Montpellier Tourist Office has begun the ISO 20121 certification process, a prerequisite to obtaining the "Sustainable & Innovative Destination" label. Many other French metropolises have already embarked on the label's certification process.

The whole region is banking on sustainable development to serve as a better host for future events.

MONTPELLIER AIRPORT TARGETING EVERY ASPECT OF BIODIVERSITY

Montpellier-Méditerranée Airport (MPL) has confirmed its commitment to the ecological transition.

MPL has achieved ACA Level 3: On 18 November 2022, MPL was upgraded to Airport Carbon Accreditation Level 3 (out of 6). Early in 2023, the airport's Corporate Social Responsibility Department will be beginning its carbon emissions inventory for the year 2022, with the goal of renewing its certification this coming June.

Installation of hotels and nesting boxes for small animals

In November, 12 hotels were installed for small land-based animals. They are made of materials - wood, earth, blocks of stone and branches - that were reclaimed after the demolition of buildings belonging to INRA (French National Institute for Agricultural Research).

The airport's property spans 4.6 km² and serves as a habitat for remarkable flora and fauna. The airport takes special care to protect its surrounding environment:

- by systematically monitoring the quality of the natural environment
- by committing its teams and its service providers to a "zero herbicides" policy beginning five years ago
- by using ecological processes to combat erosion (at the banks of its ponds)
- by setting up various habitats for protected species.

SPL OCCITANIE EVENTS

Eco-responsibility: A profound commitment at every level!

ISO 20121 certified for all its property management and event organising activities since January 2021. The results of its 2021 audit confirmed that its certification would be extended to 2022.

Substantial work has been done on waste reduction and recovery:

- microfiltered water fountains with the institution of eco-cups at food service locations
- work to reduce food waste in partnership with our caterers, for example by providing doggy bags in the venue's box seating areas
- continuation of work to offer more ethical food options to visitors and spectators.

MONTPELLIER EVENTS

Montpellier Events, the company that manages Le Corum and Le Zénith Sud, has earned its ISO 20121 certification. To embody this new ethical reality, Montpellier Events has defined three main action areas: the environment (consuming less and better), labour (operating under the best possible conditions) and society (acting in a responsible manner).

SPEAKING OF SUSTAINABILITY

Visit Les Jardins de Costebelle for a look at truly sustainable agriculture.

In the town of Villeneuve-lès-Maguelone, **Sébastien and Cédric** decided to rethink agricultural production methods. They follow lunar cycles to plant their crops for a maximum yield. Then, they add plenty of organic matter, covering the soil with straw and plant shavings, and sowing plants that, when flattened, break down and then act as completely natural fertiliser. A dozen or so great restaurants in Montpellier buy produce here, and chefs bring their peelings and crates back to the farm afterwards, in that same spirit of sustainability. A small market takes place on site every Sunday.

COMPAGNONS DE MAGUELONE

An association with three main missions, relating to medical/social, heritage and cultural issues

Disability solidarity strategy: 75% of workers have disabilities.

Maguelone's working groups grow organic crops on 6 hectares of land, cultivate a vegetable garden with organic baskets, and run two restaurants and a shop. They also work to preserve and promote the peninsula and the cathedral.

Special feature: Tours of the vineyard with a tasting of wine produced on site.

THE TRAM...

THE FOUR ELEMENTS: LINE 1 AIR - LINE 2 EARTH - LINE 3 WATER - LINE 4 FIRE

With its four tram lines, 84 stations and 56 kilometres of track, our tram network serves seven municipalities in the metropolitan area. It's the ideal mode of transport for getting from one location to the next whilst exploring the region. Not to mention travelling in style, in veritable rolling works of art created by renowned artists, symbolising the importance of art to the city.

TOP SECRET: A fifth tram line will be brought into service by the end of 2025. It will stop at 10 parks and gardens as well as Montpellier's main scientific centres. Designed by Barthélémy Toguo, this line will be dedicated to science, research and nature, based on the theme of "science and botany".

PEDICABS... TO EXPLORE THE ECUSSON

What would you say to rediscovering the city in a pedicab from Petit Trip?

Nathalie offers an alternative way to explore Montpellier with Petit Trip, an eco-friendly transport service that uses an electric tricycle to carry passengers around the city along different sightseeing routes! 45-minute tours for 2 adults and 1 child.

The Domaine has 50 hectares of organically farmed meadows, a garden where the chef grows vegetables and herbs, a chicken coop where a few families of hens cohabitate with two small goats, a gorgeous orchard at the edge of the fields and beehives where honey is collected and then enjoyed on the property. The deep water table is tapped, filtered and tested before it is bottled to supply the château with drinking water.

The spirit of the place, its family values and its drive have attracted leading figures and new friendships. All the team's talents are put to good use here. Mylène, a sales assistant and artist, creates the property's visuals. Karim, an engineer and DIYer, made the models of the mill and confectionery. Four team members are trained as gourmet guides in Occitania. Chefs and artists contribute to designing new recipes and labels. Domaine de l'Oulivie truly has its own little ecosystem. Agricultural practices here are implemented with care.

DOMAINE DE L'ARBOUSIER




After shifting from integrated agriculture to organic farming in 2010, the wine made on the property has been certified organic since 2013. Respect for nature is a priority here. That organic certification provides recognition for the cultivation practices that the vineyard is proud to employ. Spur pruning and a choice of high quality clones limits the yields to around 35 hectolitres per hectare. Substantial ploughing prevents the need for chemical weed control.

Treehouses are hidden away on this property full of character, encircled by strawberry trees and umbrella pines, with views of Pic St-Loup and the Mediterranean surrounded by grapevines.

Animals - horses, cows and goats - live here all year round, clearing unwanted vegetation and contributing to the vineyard's upkeep.

Under the banner of good cheer, Montpellier is a wine destination that invites travellers, families and the "epicurious" on a casual getaway, where they can meet winemakers who are committed to sustainable, quality viticulture, and where they can discover a unique cultural heritage that revolves around knowledge of wine.

MONTPELLIER, THE CAPITAL OF WINE

With 200 winemakers operating on nearly 3,000 hectares of land, our wine region is the gateway to Montpellier, evidence of the close ties between city and countryside. Montpellier's metropolitan area is the second largest agronomic research hub on the planet. This covers more than half of world's vitivinicultural research and includes a vine and wine research cluster that is unmatched in Europe (with 250 researchers and engineers working on oenology, viticulture and the socioeconomics of wine).

The Domaine du Vassal collection at the INRA (National Institute for Agricultural Research) in Montpellier is the biggest in the world for Vitis vinifera L., the species of grapevines grown in Europe. It is also a one-of-a-kind conservatory with 3,000 varieties of grapes.

SPOTLIGHT ON... A BIT OF HISTORY

The history of wine in our region has been triumphant at times, like after the Great French Wine Blight, and dramatic at others, like during the Winegrowers' Revolt of 1907, and has close ties to men who, although separate from the world of wine, left a strong imprint on it: Arnaud de Villeneuve, Rabelais and his "holy bottle", Jacques Cœur, Edouard Adam who improved the design of stills in the 17th century, and Jules-Emile Planchon who discovered phylloxera on 15 July 1868, etc.

Square Planchon, across from Saint-Roch Station, has a bust overlooking the entrance to the square, depicting the famed local botanist Planchon who, along with his team, fortuitously saved France from the phylloxera blight.

Other iconic places also make reference to wine, like the Faculty of Medicine with its portrait of a well-known chemist, Jean-Antoine Chaptal, the graduate of the University of Montpellier who gave his name to chaptalisation, a process of adding sugar to increase the alcohol content of wine.

At the heart of France's biggest wine region, Montpellier Méditerranée Métropole offers getaways amidst the grapevines, local wine tastings at extraordinary wineries like Domaine de Verchant and the various châteaux, like Montpellier Folies such as Château de Flaugergues and Domaine de l'Engarran. From the Pic Saint-Loup and Grés de Montpellier appellations by way of the Languedoc AOC, Montpellier the capital of wine has five PGIs and five PDOs, more than 200 winegrowers and 3,000 hectares of vineyards... enough to delight any taste bud!

Each winery has its own special activities. For example, you can go cycling through the vines at Domaine de l'Arbousier, take a wine walk with the Compagnons de Maguelone on the Villeneuvelès-Maguelone peninsula, participate in a yoga and wine class or blending workshop, walk in the shows of a winemaker for half a day at Domaine de l'Engarran, visit an 18th century country house and a Montpellier Folie with a listed park and gardens at Château de Flaugergues, witness luxury in its purest state at Domaine de Verchant with its wine cellar that contains more than 1,600 wines, do a blind tasting at Château de Fourques or enjoy a winemaker's meal. Not to mention excursions into the grapevines, a great way to explore our region and its amazing wineries. A little farther away, you can discover the vineyards of the Pic Saint-Loup and Terrasses de Larzac regions that helped build the Hérault's reputation and that offer other appealing activities.

AND NOWADAYS?

The Montpellier metropolitan area earned the Vignobles & Découvertes (Wineries & Discoveries) label on 14 March 2022. This was a first for Montpellier, confirming its commitment to the development of wine tourism and the promotion of its unique wine cultural heritage.



Montpellier has bicycles embedded in walls, a gaggle of hearts taking flight up a wall, rocks replaced by giant critters, illuminated rubbish bins, and more. Here, you can find permanent or ephemeral, abstract or figurative art on any street corner, some of it sanctioned, some of it not.

Montpellier is one of a handful of cities in France where all the latest trends in street art appear around every corner. Whether it's old or new, amateur or professional, street art is spreading in Montpellier.

QUAI DU VERDANSON, DEDICATED TO GRAFFITI

One of the most off-the-wall spots in Montpellier is like an outdoor graffiti museum. If you're curious, take the time to park your car and wind your way down to the serpentine channel to discover the treasures hidden there. Like a real living museum, the walls of the canal are completely covered with graffiti, tags and other extraordinary frescoes. This is a place of perpetual creation, with new artwork regularly covering up the old. Street artists practice here, where their creative talent can be unveiled to all!

RONDELET DISTRICT

Near the post office, oversized artwork by Mist and Zest dominates the scenery. Mist treats passers-by to a creative explosion in which paint drips meld with letters. And just a few steps away, Zest employs geometric shapes to suggest a mysterious female figure.

ECUSSON DISTRICT

The Ecusson district is a favourite playground for street artists in Montpellier. There's something for every taste: frescoes, stencils, graffiti, collages, trompe-l'oeil, and more. Street art culture is everywhere here, on the ground, on the walls and hanging in the air. Look up and let your footsteps be guided by a bicycle embedded in a wall by Monsieur BMX, the mocking appearance of a mosaic space invader, and the trompe-l'oeil images at Saint-Roch or on Place Edouard Adam...

MEDITERRANEE NEIGHBOURHOOD

The Méditerranée neighbourhood abounds with frescoes, stencils and graffiti painted by Montpellier's street artists. Moke, Ose, Sunra, Arkane and Nubian are just some of the artists who have left their mark here, to the great delight of anyone walking by.

AROUND MONTPELLIER THERE'S MORE TO SEE!

Street art can never be confined one place, never mind a city. And for good reason: graffiti artists are constantly on the lookout for new "canvases". For example, for the inauguration of Languedoc's new motorway in Lattes, artists were given the chance to occupy the columns holding up the motorway overpass at Avenue Georges Frêche. That work is still visible today.

In Pérols, the town council has also allowed artists to express themselves on a wall dubbed "Le M.U.R.", resulting in an immense fresco that can be seen from the motorway to the beaches.

Juvignac hosts 34°, a festival featuring an art walk through town with five frescoes by five artists.

Since *Baillargues* put on a group show entitled L'Art du Graffiti with work by three local artists, Zest, Smole and Gum, the town has continued to support street art.

A WALL OF THE TOURIST OFFICE!

The Montpellier Tourist Office has provided a wall in its garden that street artists can use for self-expression.

It's currently the turn of Enaert, a local street artist who painted a piece for us that will remain in place until summer 2023.

As a mediaeval town, Baillargues is very attached to its heritage, so the town called on painter Claire Aton to beautify its centre based on the themes of Baillargues during the Revolution, a fresco dedicated to olive-growing traditions and a large-scale fresco of the Napoleonic era.

Saint-Jean-de-Védas plans to create an urban art walk through its streets and its neighbourhoods, in the form of frescoes painted on walls.

In *Fabrègues*, in the Gardiole mountain range, Cit'Art has created a hiking trail that passes by the cisterns that were taken over by street artists chosen by the association Line Up (Eackone, Honk, Maye, Momies, Vania and Zest) and by Reda from Collectif FU.

THEY'VE GOT STREET ART UNDER THEIR SKIN! LINE UP

Active on the urban and contemporary art scene since 2015, Line Up is committed to helping make ideas a reality. They help beautify sites, for example by refurbishing urban furniture. The association's artistic support project also includes inviting artists to participate in occasional residencies.





SALAMECH

Born in Montpellier in 1985. Weaned on urban cultures and fuelled by intensive graffiti work, Salamech creates a universe that comes to life with the energy of the city. As a street specialist, he has an attentive yet offbeat perspective on his environment.



SUNRA

The most poetic of street artists, Sunra has flooded the city with hearts. He draws inspiration from artists the likes of Banksy, a pioneer in the world of street art, Basquiat and his colourful, naive and highly expressive world, and Picasso for his modern brushstrokes.



ZEST AKA

outbursts that watched him grow up. Zest puts colours together as if they were words and gracefully conveys a visual language that is structured, nuanced and intentionally sparkling.



MONSIEUR BMX

Monsieur BMX collects and restores old bicycles every day before attaching them all over the streets of Montpellier. Be sure to look up as you're walking around!



OUPS

Around Montpellier, everyone has seen his painted rocks. Over the past decade or so, Oups has been painting rocks that he calls "Cox" (from the French coccinelles, or ladybirds). The artist is a painter and a sculptor and occasionally collaborates with other creatives, like Sunra, to produce collages that express notions such as love, sharing, respect for the environment and music. Although Montpellier is where Oups is most active, his Cox form a sort of treasure hunt all across France.



VOGLIO BENE

Bénédicte Piccollillo's new brand is a decorative one inspired by street art. It is an attractive mix of her work as a street artist and her research into art history. She has a predilection for a sort of revisited Renaissance style. These days, Bénédicte Piccollillo's creations are winning fans in France and abroad (in Italy, Germany, Switzerland, United Kingdom, Australia, New Caledonia and more).

MEDIAEVAL MONTPELLIER

Mediaeval Montpellier was a crossroads of cultures, knowledge and goods. With the increasing popularity of pilgrimages, the city became a major stop along the Camin Roumieu, one of the four routes of the Camino de Santiago (the southern route). Pilgrims would find room and board there, the protection of Notre-Dame des Tables, and the possibility of exchanging money and obtaining medical treatment. The remnants of this prosperous era can be found on the façades and in the courtyards of the old "hostals", like Gayon's bedchamber at the Ostal des Carcassonne, a home built in the 13th to 14th centuries that contained a bedchamber in which paintings recounted the life of Saint Eustace, the patron saint of drapers.

Montpellier's mediaeval mikveh, a 13th century ritual bath designed for the Jewish rite of purification, is evidence of the size of the Jewish community, that played a major role in the development and influence of Montpellier. Montpellier has one of Europe's most beautiful mikvehs that is still in excellent condition today. The mikveh is fed by a continuously renewed groundwater source. The water comes out through an aperture,

symbolising its passage. You enter by going down 15 ritual stairs leading to the undressing room, with the bath itself visible below through the gemelled window. It was discovered by chance under the floor of a basement in a private home in 1985. It can only be visited on an "Essential Montpellier – Historic Centre" tour or on special open days!


PRIVATE


Montpellier has nearly 80 private manors built during the classical era, hiding behind massive gates and featuring wide, well-lit courtyards and staircases with wrought iron railings. Those private courtyards are real hidden gems that can only be visited today on a guided tour led by the Tourist Office. But still, keep your eyes peeled! Because you never know when you'll come across one of these gates opening or closing and be able to sneak a quick peek inside. A simple stroll around town can suddenly take an unexpected turn...

MONTPELLIER FOLIES... WITH FOLIAGE!

These "houses amidst foliage" first appeared on the outskirts of Montpellier during the 18th century, becoming the country counterparts to notables' private manors in the city. While all of them boast superb gardens, a difference should be made between the country Folies, like the Châteaux de Flaugergues, la Mogère and l'Engarran, and the city Folies, such as Hôtel Haguenot along the side of Place Royale du Peyrou.







PLACE ROYALE DU PEYROU



Thanks to its location and the amazing views that it offers, Place du Peyrou is an iconic place in Montpellier. In 1685, King Louis XIV chose Montpellier to receive a statue of himself astride a horse. Building a royal square, the most complete expression of monarchical glory, meant creating a setting that would be worthy of a statue of the sovereign. Work began in 1689 to level and expand the space. It was only 75 years later, in 1766, under the reign of Louis XVI, that the beautification work was able to begin. Once it was completed in 1775, Place Royale du Peyrou was considered to be one of the most stunning squares in the kingdom, for its location and its fantastic views. And the story didn't end there...

SQUARES LARGE AND SMALL



Montpellier cultivates delightful options for strolling, from Place de la Comédie (arguably the biggest sight in town) to Place Royale du Peyrou (a dream for anyone who loves history or wide open spaces), by way of Place de la Canourgue and its view of the rooftop of Montpellier Cathedral. Walk through squares large and small, because they all have a story to tell!

A TRAMWAY NAMED DESIGN



With its four tram lines, 84 stations and 56 kilometres of track, our tram network serves seven municipalities in the metropolitan area. It's the ideal mode of transport for getting from one location to the next whilst exploring the region. Not to mention travelling in style, in veritable rolling works of art created by Garouste and Bonetti (Lines 1 and 2) and Christian Lacroix (Lines 3 and 4).

ANTIGONE, A CONTEMPORARY DISTRICT



Nicely complementing Montpellier's historic centre, Antigone district has a Greco-Roman feel to it, with huge buildings made of white stone, plus cornices, statues and fountains alluding to ancient mythology... And yet, this district only saw the light of day in the late 1980s, under the impetus of Georges Frêche, then Mayor of Montpellier. Another large-scale has been Port Marianne (1992-present). The Port Marianne concept can be divided into five distinct neighbourhoods: Consuls de Mer, Richter, Blaise Pascal, Jardins de la Lironde and Jacques Cœur.



FACULTY OF MEDICINE

The Faculty of Medicine came to be in 1220. Over the years, it also served as a Benedictine monastery founded in the 14th century, a bishopric and then a school of health. It the oldest medical school in the Western world which is still operating today. It celebrated its 800th anniversary in 2020. Its Anatomy Conservatory has nearly 5,600 anatomical pieces and wax models meant to be used for teaching.

The conservatory is currently closed for renovations, as is the Musée Atger art museum.

Montpellier owes its fame as the cradle of medical instruction to its school, the oldest faculty of medicine in the Western world to be continuously in operation since its beginnings. This is such a historical treasure that the city aims to have it included on UNESCO's World Heritage List.

DID YOU KNOW?

AN ASTONISHING EDICT

Montpellier was only two centuries old when, in 1180, its lord, Guilhem VIII, signed an astonishing edict, stating that anyone, regardless of their origins or religion, had the right to teach medicine in Montpellier. Thus was born the Faculty of Medicine, and with it, the destiny of the city.

ANATOMY CONSERVATORY

Originally designed for anatomical instruction, the conservatory was an incredible educational tool for generations of students before the development of modern techniques for exploring the human body. The collection, which houses nearly 5,600 anatomical pieces and wax models, has been a listed historic monument since 2004.

Medicine, the oldest one in the Western world that is still active today. An ancient tradition whose ties to the present and future have only grown.

Although Hippocrates was born in Kos, Montpellier has claimed him as our own, since we have been a cradle of medicine for the last eight centuries. We have also had famous students here, like François Rabelais and Nostradamus, and instructors the likes of Arnaud de Villeneuve and Gui de Chauliac, after whom two of our hospitals are named. Our region has put this historic legacy to use and developed it to become a reference in the field.

JARDIN DES PLANTES



The Royal Garden of Montpellier was created by edit in 1593. making it the oldest establishment of its kind in France. This botanical garden opened to the public in 1841 and continues to receive large numbers of visitors, including botanists, doctors, pharmacists and students, as well as plant lovers and tourists. The garden has undergone a whole series of improvements ever since the 16th century, namely including a pond (populated by frogs) and a Second Empire landscaped garden.

PHARMACIE & CHAPELLE **DE LA MISERICORDE**

The historic Miséricorde complex is home to Montpellier's last working apothecary. Since the Sisters of Charity of Saint Vincent de Paul left the site in 2001, this place of remembrance, a listed historic monument, has been managed by the City of Montpellier. The pharmacy is made up of two rooms (an 18th century dispensary and a 19th century one) and contains an extremely rare collection of assorted apothecary and pharmacy jars, pitchers and spouted jars, evidence of centuries of pottery in Montpellier.



LIQUORICE

In 1923, Montpellier had five confectioners who all made liquorice, gumdrops, marshmallows and panned candy. They were the last remnants of a guild dating back to the Middle Ages, when confectionery was not too different from pharmacy, in a city where Jacques Cœur had introduced products from the East.

This story truly started with Jacques Cœur, a merchant based in Montpellier who made a fortune in the city. At the time, Jacques Cœur had a fleet of ships that traded throughout the Mediterranean Basin. He himself went as far as Sudan, where gum arabic is harvested, an ingredient that forms the base for all liquorice candies. From his travels, he brought liquorice root, which grew along the Mediterranean, and gum arabic from Sudan.

At that point, Montpellier was known for its Faculty of Pharmacy and Medicine, and the spices that Jacques Cœur brought with him were used to prepared medications. In Montpellier, in the days of Rabelais, apothecaries were highly inventive, and students gave out panned candy to celebrate completing their theses. Today, Auzier Chabernac continues this local tradition, with its know-how and its traditional recipes for vanilla fudge, liquorice fudge, liquorice sweets with honey, marshmallows and of course panned candy. (Find more information about this confectionery under "Time for tasty treats".)

The medicinal properties of liquorice have been recognised since Antiquity. The Babylonians supposedly used it to cure the plague, and the Romans to help with digestion. Today, the European Commission acknowledges that liquorice is very good for digestion. Wild liquorice began to grow around the edges of Montpellier in the Middle Ages. The city's apothecaries used it as an ingredient in their medicines. As an added bonus, gum arabic has no caloric value.

PERFUME

Although it may have been forgotten, Montpellier was the capital of perfume, long before Grasse. The local scrubland (garrigue) was teeming with fragrances, and spices from around the world transited through Mediterranean trading posts. This allowed spice-selling apothecaries to begin making their own remedies and elixirs.

Arnaud de Villeneuve, a chemist and scholar, developed the process of distilling alcohol and flower water. Then came the era of the University of Medicine and the Jardin des Plantes, the creation of Hungary Water and the famous Theriac of Montpellier. In the 17th century, there were around 100 parfumiers in Montpellier, and in 18th, local man Jean-Louis Fargeon even became the darling of Marie Antoinette and the royal family.

Some of the city's other most famous parfumiers included Sébastien Matte La Faveur, who reformulated Hungary Water, also known as Eau de Montpellier, which King Louis XIV and Madame de Sévigné both really enjoyed, and Jean Fargeon, perfumer to Mademoiselle d'Orléans. This history is told by Arthur Dupuy and Caroline Redon Jauffret in their book, Montpellier: The Time-Honored Capital of French Perfume (EdiSens).

For some time now, Arthur Dupuy has been filling the Montpellier Tourist Office with the scent of Balsamum. Imagine a drop of incense that summons the yellowed pages of old manuscripts and the cold wax of candles, the smell of beautiful black liquorice mixed with damp wood and the enveloping sweetness of dried fruit. This perfumed composition combines a waft of sweetness with powerful spicy and balsamic notes.

Scents: Incense – Black liquorice – Wood – Spice – Balsamic – Myrrh – Patchouli

AN EXPERIENCE WITH MANADE FANGOUSE IS PURE MAGIC!

This manade (bull and horse farm) has some 180 heads of cattle, including around 30 calves.

Each year, the bulls are taken to Courses Camarguaises (see Glossary). The farm, located in the birthplace of the Camargue breed, has some 50 semi-free-ranging horses, a dozen or so brood mares and as many births per year.

They regularly hold Camargue evenings with Romani music and a horse show.

GLOSSARY

Course Camarguaise: A frenzied dance with a bull, in which the razeteur (bullfighter) attempts to pull off ribbons attached between the animal's horns.

Encierro: Bulls are released into a street that is closed off on either end, where they are inflamed and challenged by youths from the villages.

Abrivado: Bulls from the fields are escorted to the arena by riders in a V formation.

DID YOU KNOW?

Montpellier has an extremely difficult climbing route. For the route in the Pic Saint-Loup sector, the grade is estimated at 9b+ (5.15c). It is one of the most challenging in France, if not the world. It is located on the Pic Saint-Loup mountain in the Hérault, a short distance from Montpellier. The region's cliffs are heaven for climbers, with more than 700 identified routes.

CYCLING ACCESS TO THE CITY

THE MEDITERRANEAN CYCLE ROUTE

In France, the EuroVelo 8 (Cadiz-Izmir) connects the Pyrenees to the Alps, from Le Perthus to Menton, along 850 kilometres of cycle paths and small low-traffic roads.

Montpellier is one of the stops along the way, like other historic sites that forged the history of this part of the Mediterranean Basin. In ecotourism mode, come and explore the city's narrow mediaeval streets and fragrant markets with your bicycle! Ready, steady, ride! The Mediterranean Cycle Route will take you from Palavas, along the Lez, to Montpellier.

ViaRhôna passes close to Montpellier, between Aigues-Mortes, La Grande-Motte, Palavas and Sète, by way of Villeneuve-lès-Maguelone.

MEJEAN NATURE RESERVE



Want to watch some white storks just outside Montpellier? No problem! Maison de la Nature in Lattes was built between lagoons and a salt marsh, at the edge of the Méjean lagoon. Waymarked trails guide visitors through this remarkable area, including a 2.5 kilometre loop that is wheelchair accessible. The nature reserve has been protected since 1985, thanks to the Conservatoire du Littoral and the site's manager, the Town of Lattes. It is home to a variety of amazing flora and fauna, such as pink flamingos, black-winged stilts, European pond turtles, summer snowflakes, bunch-flowered daffodils, and especially the white storks that are traditionally associated with Alsace.



Montpellier was the first conurbation to be designated a "City of Art and History" in a network that now encompasses 190 municipalities. This label gives our metropolitan area national and international recognition and makes our region a highly prized destination.

To ensure art has a central place in cities, this label evaluates their beautification strategies: the boldness of their architecture, the originality of their community zones, the singularity of their urban furniture, their expression of public art, etc.

LA FRENCH TECH

Montpellier Méditerranée Métropole was one of the first in its category to have its ecosystem labelled a Métropole French Tech. This national initiative, which was launched in 2013, is designed to accelerate the development of French startups and boost their international standing. The process of obtaining this label involved a tremendous mobilisation amongst the region's entire innovation ecosystem and the ability to come together to work on a major project for the region.





UNESCO LEARNING CITY

The city of Montpellier has joined the UNESCO Global Network of Learning Cities. That network counts more than 200 cities in 46 countries (including Beijing, Mexico City, Tunis, Nairobi, Okinawa, Turin, Melbourne and Chengdu). France now has four cities in the network, with Montpellier and Evry-Courcouronnes joining Clermont-Ferrand and Mantes-la-Jolie.

VIGNOBLES & DECOUVERTES

The Montpellier metropolitan area has earned the Vignobles & Découvertes (Wineries & Discoveries) label from Atout France. It is awarded for a period of three years, in recognition of regions that have developed their wine tourism.

■ Bv air

Montpellier has direct flights from Paris (1h 10m), London (1h 45m), Amsterdam (1h 45m) and over 20 other major cities. Montpellier Méditerranée Airport is 8 kilometres from the city centre. Shuttle service is available.

■ By train

Two TGV train stations: Montpellier Sud de France, 6 km from the city centre, and Montpellier Saint-Roch in the city centre. Direct trains from Paris Gare de Lyon (3h 15m), Paris Charles de Gaulle Airport (4h), Marne-la-Vallée (3h 45m), Lille (4h 45m), Barcelona (3h) and Brussels (5h 45).

The A9 and A75/A750 motorways run through Montpellier. Warning: Montpellier is located in a low emission zone which restricts access by the most polluting vehicles. A Crit'Air sticker is required for any vehicles driving in the LEZ. These can be ordered online, exclusively from www.certificat-air.gouv.fr.

A range of services is available for your transport within the metropolitan area:

4 tram lines, 41 bus lines, 57 Vélomagg bike share stations, 9 P+Tram car parks with nearly 5,000 parking spaces for tram riders, 6 car parks in the city centre with close to 4,000 spaces, and 35 car share locations in partnership with Modulauto.
